

SPIRITUAL WARFARE: DECEPTION Scott Hansen, Lead Pastor November 13, 2011

Lesson Aim: To reveal the nature of deception so that the believer can discern the truth in order to live freely in Christ.



connecting

Prayer: Start your time in prayer together, asking the Holy Spirit to lead your discussion with discernment and truth.

Ice-breaker: Share about a time when you were completely deceived. How did it make you feel? OR have you ever seen someone close to you hurt deeply by deception?

- 1. Read Matthew 24:4, 11 and 2 Corinthians 11:3. The New Testament makes it clear that the deception of believers is a real and constant threat. Read Jeremiah 17:9. One source of this deception is ourselves. Looking over the Sources of Deceit: Ourselves section in your message notes, can you share any examples of ways you have deceived yourself?
- 2. **Read Galatians 6:7.** Practically speaking, what does it mean to "reap what you sow"? Are there any examples (positive or negative) you can share of seeing this principle in action?
- 3. **Read 1 Corinthians 15:33.** What are some examples of how you have seen or experienced this aspect of self-deception to be true?
- 4. What are some ways you have been able to find balance in this area (developing a core of Christian friendships while not becoming too isolated from the lost)?
- 5. Jesus makes it clear in **Matthew 24:24** that deception will also come through "false messiahs and false prophets." **Read Jeremiah 23:16-24.** Why would these false prophets be motivated to speak words of comfort about the judgment that was coming? Why was God so angry about their proclamations?
- 6. Can you think of some modern-day examples of false prophets? What kind of damage has been done through their teaching?
- 7. **Read 1 Timothy 4:1; 1 John 2:18 and I John 4:1-6.** What are some present-day lies from the Enemy that the world has really bought into?
- 8. **Read Proverbs 14:33, 16:21, 17:24, 18:15.** What are some characteristics of discernment described in these Proverbs?
- 9. **Read 1 Corinthians 2:14-15.** Think of someone you know who has demonstrated a good deal of discernment. What are some words you would use to describe them as a person?
- 10. What are some ways you can strive for a similar direction in your life and refine your ability to distinguish between good and evil?

INTRODUCTION

- ▶ If I tempt you... you know it ▶ If I accuse you... you know it ▶ If I deceive you... you don't know it
- ► Matthew 24:4 Jesus said: "Watch out that no one deceives you."
- ▶ 2 Corinthians 11:3; 2 John 7; Matthew 24:11, 24, 25

SOURCES OF DECEIT (2 Corinthians 4:4; Revelation 12:9)

- A. OURSELVES (Jeremiah 17:9; Hebrews 3:13)
- We have deceived ourselves if we only hear the Word and do not do it (James 1:22; 4:17; 1 Peter 1:13).
- We deceive ourselves if we say we have no sin (1 John 1:8).
- We deceive ourselves if we think we are something when we are nothing (Galatians 6:3).
- We deceive ourselves if we think that we are wise in this age (1 Corinthians 3:18, 19).
- We deceive ourselves if we think ourselves to be religious and yet do not bridle our own tongue (James 1:26).
- We deceive ourselves if we think we will not reap what we sow (Galatians 6:7).
- We deceive ourselves if we think the unrighteous will inherit the Kingdom of God (1 Corinthians 6:9).
- We deceive ourselves if we think we can continue to associate with bad company and not be corrupted (1 Corinthians 15:33).
- B. FALSE PROPHETS & TEACHERS (Matthew 7:15; cf. Jeremiah 23:16-22, 25-40)
- They will show signs & wonders (Matthew 24:24; Revelation 13:11-14; Deuteronomy 13:1-4)
- They will work within the church (2 Corinthians 11:13-15)
- 3 They have common characteristics (2 Peter 2:1, 10-19)
- Despise authority (v.10) ► Arrogant (v.10) ► Carouse where they don't belong (v.13) ► Adulterous eyes (v.14)
- C. DECEIVING SPIRITS (1 Timothy 4:1; 1 John 2:18; 4:1-6)

DISCERNMENT

- A. MOTIVE IS CRUCIAL (1 Kings 3:1-12)
 - Not to promote self, nor gain an advantage
 - 2 But to understand justice (i.e. distinguish between right and wrong)
- B. DISCERNMENT IS ON THE PLANE OF GOOD & EVIL (1 Corinthians 12:10)
- C. DISCERNMENT IS ESSENTIALLY A FUNCTION OF THE <u>SPIRIT</u>, NOT THE <u>MIND</u> (1 Corinthians 2:14-15)
- D. INCREASES WITH MATURITY (Hebrews 5:11-14; Proverbs 4:18)
